

LOVE HIM or hate him (or is it all really just about the hair?), real estate developer Donald Trump sticks it out there in his characteristic frank manner: "I like thinking big. If you're going to be thinking anything, you might as well think big." And thinking big is exactly what the owners of this spectacular home were doing when they designed their 6,000 square foot dwelling, perched on a forested lot high in the leafy oasis of Broadmead.


It helps that the home's contractor/developer was none other than multiple CARE Award-winner Bob Gill, Vice-President of the Canadian Home Builders' Association and owner of Pacific Concept Developments. Gill designed and built the award-



Curves abound in Gill's design, linking living spaces with flow and grace. winning surrounding homes as well, as part of Valewood Trail Estates, a goodly chunk of land cleaved off from a neighbouring estate several years back. Built on a corner lot, this imposing house is enhanced by its natural surroundings: Broadmead's ever-present tall coniferous trees frame the backdrop; a carefully preserved stand of oak mingles with a natural outcropping of bedrock on the west side of the property; the wild natural growth of the adjoining estate creates a sense of countryside privacy; and a threelot span of backyard, complete with parts of the estate's original winding pathways, separates the owners from their nearest neighbours. It's a little hunk of Heaven right here in the city.


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



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Maple cabinetry and granite countertops lend a luxurious feel to the functional kitchen workspace.

balcony and sandstone masonry. A round turret softens the southwest corner of the house, and a variety of angles and nooks impart a welcoming feel.

The circular theme resurfaces upon entering the home, where immediately the visitor's eye is drawn forward into the


foyer by gently curved walls and a finely detailed granite oval, carefully inlaid in the marble tile floor. "I like a lot of circles," explains Gill. "I wanted a circular focal point of the house and everything to radiate from that." The rounded foyer is capped by a dome evolved from three circles, intricately painted by millwright and artist Tom Kendall, and designed to dovetail with the circular staircase and balustrade that "flows like a ribbon" from the main floor to the open upper level. Each piece of wrought iron rail on the stairway is unique, crafted locally by Crescent Moon Forge and Ironworks to match the exterior metalwork.

The main entrance and stairwell area is circular; the living room off the entrance is circular; the dining nook is partly circular. The pattern isn't overbearing; rather, the arrangement gently connects the intimate spaces throughout the spacious home. It's a tough assignment to build a "huge, yet cozy" house as per the owners' wish, but by teaming the circular theme with earth tones and natural textures on ceilings, walls and floors, Gill was able to achieve it. The walls throughout are painted a

mellow caramel — a comely complement to the maple woodwork and the natural textiles of the furnishings. Pale limestone on the main level, courtesy of Island Floor Centre, is warmed by wool-blend carpet purposely laid to create the feel and look of area rugs. The earthy, neutral palette creates a feeling of timelessness, which in turn alleviates the need to redecorate in several years' time.

And indeed, the main rooms engender a feeling of snug harmony. Southwest sun from the floor-to-ceiling windows bathes the living room, and a wrought-iron Juliet balcony high on a wall efficiently channels this bright light into the upper hallway. The dark granite, maple cabinetry and stainless steel of the kitchen are softened by rounded counters, bronze-finish hardware and amber crystal pendant lights twinkling over the island. There's a small spice kitchen located just at the end of a short hallway, perfectly appointed — and well ventilated — for making those tasty dishes that sometimes create lingering smells.

In the family room, a wooden panelled "barrel" ceiling with recessed halogen potlights soars above a bank of north-facing windows, counterbalanced by a commercial fireplace (read: big enough to qualify for the lobby of Trump Towers) made with the same Pender Island sandstone used on the outside of the house. The fireplace masonry is painstakingly chiselled so that each brick fits perfectly against its neighbours in a mortarless system. To eschew a cavernous feeling, the room itself is small in area and is anchored by spacious wooden bookcases, comfortable



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

Also on the main level is a master suite. While the large sitting area with adjoining bathroom and bedroom is an ideal setup for a current live-in relative, this separate apartment is an example of forward thinking and building for purpose: the main floor suite will be useful when age reduces the owners' mobility.

The upstairs master suite offers an ensuite bath with steam shower, soaker Jacuzzi tub, raised vessel sinks, a marble countertop that matches the tub's surround and plenty of warm accents such as wood-and-wicker baskets, chocolatey brown candles to bathe by, and striking pieces of original art. An elegant pane of blasted glass, courtesy of Gabriel Blasted Glass, separates the bath from the bedroom. A spacious sitting room adjoins the master bedroom and bespeaks lazy Sunday mornings reading the paper. Two smaller bedrooms and an artfully appointed bath complete the upper floor.

Descending below ground level brings the visitor to another array of rooms designed expressly for function: a home office is lit by a sunny row of high southfacing windows; a two-car garage on the

west side of the house offers a haven for the busy businessman to tinker with his prized Mercedes (two other garages are accessed by the home's south side); an extra bedroom offers space for guests. And the pièce de résistance? A wellappointed media room complete with a four-walled mural of a scene from the

Greek coastline, a wet bar and wine area, a projection system, surround-sound and theatre seating for five. And to inject the movie-going experience with that extra little bit of realism, the seats (designed by a chiropractor so as not to stress the back, by the way) have actuators in them for those authenticity junkies who insist upon actually feeling the explosions and car chases as they happen onscreen.

But now, to practicalities. In this age of heightened awareness regarding the environmental impact of the way we live, Gill added features such as low-flush toilets, insulation within every wall and floor, efficient in-floor heating, a circulation pump to keep warm water accessible to all taps, individual thermostat controls, and a programmable system that can control all lighting from one area if necessary. The house is "wired for the future" meaning that there are jacks for all manner of tech-ware in every wall. (No more arranging a room's furnishings according to the cable outlet.) This unique home, with its thoughtful planning and meaningful design, is indeed the result of dreaming big.

And I'll bet Trump would approve of the location, too. ▼
